

# Session 4: Michael Riley "Preaching the Glory of the Gospel" Romans 1:1–6

**Introduction:** A theological affirmation of eternal generation

The Gospel of God...Concerning His Son

Romans 1:1–7

#### Declared to Be the Son of God in Power

"Son of God" is a title that applied to many people/beings/groups:

- 1. The angels (Job 1–2, 38 [also Genesis 6:1–4])
- 2. The nation of Israel (Exodus 4:22; Hosea 11:1)
- 3. Adam (Luke 3:38)
- 4. David's royal heirs (2 Samuel 7:14)

Jesus's declaration as the Son is linked to the Father's raising of him.

- 1. "was raised" (repeatedly throughout the NT)
- 2. Psalm 2; Acts 13:33
- 3. Philippians 2:5–11
- 4. Matthew 28:16–20

# Session 5: Andy Hudson "Is It Better to Bury or to Burn? A Biblical Look at Cremation"

It is impossible to thoroughly address all of the issues related to cremation in a single session. I promise you that I will not answer all of your questions. My goal in this session is to provide several principles that form a framework for making decisions regarding the care of dead bodies. Consider the following principles:

1. **It matters what we do with the body after death.** The body is part of the image of God in humans. The body is not the shell that holds the person. It is part of the person. Therefore, the body has dignity or sanctity. That dignity remains after death.

2. **Nothing done to the body after death prevents bodily resurrection.** We can do nothing to prevent God from fulfilling His promise of eternal life in glorified bodies.

3. Scripture gives no universal mandate regarding the care of the body after death. All information in Scripture regarding the care of the body after death is descriptive. Scripture seems to describe some flexibility in the care of the body after death.

4. Our care of the body after death makes a statement about our theology. We ought to be clear what cremation (and burial for that matter) communicates in our culture. What is communicated can change in different cultures and times.

# \*Practical suggestions for guiding saints through decisions about care of bodies after death:

- 1. Realize that you, as shepherds, may not even be consulted in the decision-making process.
- 2. Offer your assistance but don't force your preferences. Honor the choices of the deceased and the family of the deceased as much as possible.
- 3. Teach the personhood of the dead body—encourage proper care of the body after death.
- 4. Teach that death is the penalty for sin—encourage mourning over celebration.
- 5. Teach the hope of the resurrection—encourage options that support this hope.
- 6. Talk to local funeral and crematorium directors so you know what options and advice the saints will receive when they employ the services of these businesses.
- 7. Pray for and comfort the saints no matter what they decide about the care of the body after death.

# Session 6: Steve Thomas "Every Pastor Is an Interim Pastor" (Hebrews 13:7–14)

Text: Hebrews 13:7–14 (ESV)

<sup>7</sup>Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. <sup>8</sup> Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. <sup>9</sup> Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings, for it is good for the heart to be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited those devoted to them. <sup>10</sup> We have an altar from which those who serve the tent have no right to eat. <sup>11</sup> For the bodies of those animals whose blood is brought into the holy places by the high priest as a sacrifice for sin are burned outside the camp. <sup>12</sup> So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through his own blood. <sup>13</sup> Therefore let us go to him outside the camp and bear the reproach he endured. <sup>14</sup> For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city that is to come.

Introduction: Hebrews 13:8 contains a well-known, well-loved, oft-quoted declaration: *Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever*. Too often it appears as a prooftext in discussions of the immutability of Christ. While Christ *is* immutable, the author of Hebrews did not write these words to make that point. A closer look at the larger passage reveals that verse 8 serves as a hinge that links together verse 7 and what follows in verses 9-14. The author's concern was the preservation of the truth of the gospel of Christ across generations (yesterday, today, and forever). The paragraph as a whole teaches us that . . .

Today's take-home truth: For Christ's sake, we must stand as the nexus between the past and the future.

- I. Yesterday, God entrusted us to the care of spiritual leaders.
  - A. The Word of God was their source of authority.
  - B. The Word of God was their central priority.
- II. Today, God calls us to continue the work they began.
  - A. Think of them with kind regard.
  - B. Carefully ponder the value of their life's work.
  - C. Then, mimic their faithfulness.

# III. Tomorrow, God commands us to persevere in the message we received from them.

- A. Persevere because Christ never changes. 8
- B. Persevere because Christ's opponents abound. 9
- C. Persevere because Christ alone can save. 10-12
- D. Persevere because Christ secures our hope. 13-14
  - 1. Stand with him though it is difficult. 13
  - 2. Stand with him because this place is not our home. 14
